
6M Quad

Russ K0LUW makes a lot of his own antennae and the latest is a 4 element 6M quad. This is possibly in response to the local Tuesday night 6M net on 50.200 at 8PM.

The boom is made from those surplus fiberglass tubes that fit together to make temporary antenna supports, in this case 9-10 feet in a horizontal plane. The spreaders are also fiberglass, but are sold by TSC stores as electric fence posts. Russ had a big spool of #16 wire that he used for the elements.

Fed at the bottom of element 2 counting from the back (reflector) Russ put a bunch of ferrite cores over the LMR 400 coax at the feed point to keep the RF on the antenna and not the coax shield. It's horizontally polarized, and Russ says the gain is similar to a 5 element yagi. (One local guy said he found his 'S' meter needle 15 inches away on the right side of his radio after a first contact with Russ.)

One of his first contacts on 6M was to Puerto Rico, and yes, the band was open.

Minutes of the previous meeting had been mailed to everyone (whose E-Mail addr is known) but no one including the Sec'y had a printed copy handy so we didn't vote on them. Program

The program was two show and tells, a couple 7 Watt solar panels that Art UWR brought along, and a 'Waterfall' demo by Rich ZQG. Using speaker output from a Kenwood 440 tuned to 14.070 acoustically coupled to an Apple laptop running the Cocoa Modem program, he successfully copied several PSK31 QSOs using a 35 ft. long wire antenna looped over window blinds indoors.

Climbing Accident

The following is the response to a request for additional information sent to an insurance company:

I am writing in response to your request for additional information regarding my claim for coverage of my accident on August 25, 2011. On the form, I indicated that the cause of the accident was "poor planning" and you said in your letter that I should explain more fully. I trust that the following information will be sufficient.

I own a house on a hill and have qualified for an Amateur Radio license. My dream has been to put up an 80 foot tall self supporting tower, and after saving several years I have constructed it and on the day of the accident put up several antennas at the top. When finished, I found that I had over the course of trips up and down the tower left some 300 pounds of tools and miscellaneous parts near the top that needed to be brought down. Not wanting to make multiple trips or to drop the items for fear that they would be broken or break something, I decided to lower them down in a barrel using a rope and pulley. I raised the barrel and secured the rope to the base of the tower, and then climbed up and loaded the tools and such into the barrel. Then I climbed back down to the ground and untied the rope, holding it so that the 300 pound barrel would not come down too quickly.

You will note in the attached medical record that I weigh 165 pounds. Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground, I neglected to let go of the rope until I was so high off the ground that I feared injury if I fell. I was pulled up the side of the tower at a great rate of speed, and a little before the forty foot point, met the bottom of the barrel that was coming down. The result was the fractured skull and broken collarbone noted on my medical record.

The impact slowed me only momentarily, and I did not stop moving until two fingers of my hand were jammed knuckle deep into the pulley. This explains the broken fingers and abrasions.

I was able to hold onto the rope despite the pain, but this did no good because at approximately the same time I was jamming my fingers into the pulley, the barrel struck the ground and its bottom split wide open, spilling all my tools and parts on the ground. Without the weight of the tools, the barrel weighed only 20 pounds giving me an edge of some 145 pounds.

Still clutching the rope to no avail, I began to fall back down the side of the tower. My descent was slowed somewhat when I met the empty barrel coming up, the result of which was my fractured ankles and lacerations to my lower body, as well as significant abrasions when my jeans caught on the hook holding the barrel and were ripped off. I landed atop the pile of tools which explains my three cracked vertebrae and the unfortunate lodging of the hammer, as described in the medical record.

Unfortunately, at that point my pain was such that without thinking I let go of the rope, and was therefore left lying on the pile of tools looking up as the barrel began its fall toward me from 80 feet up the tower. The impact of the barrel this third time was less than it might have been but the lower steel rim did cause the four broken ribs and upper body Bouncing off me, it also tipped the contusions. twelve foot tall thick wall Durasteel gin pole which had been on the ground leaning against the tower toward the house, thirteen feet from the tower. At that point there was no damage to the house, but as it fell, the tip of the gin pole struck the edge of the natural gas meter on the side of my house with enough force to cause a major leak. In my weakened condition I did not notice the hissing sound of escaping gas and thus did not remove the lit cigar which I had somehow managed to keep clenched between my teeth. It was when the gas met the lit cigar with predictable result that I received the stated third degree burns over 90% of my body. Thankfully, firemen called to the house fire, discovered me and called the emergency medical personnel.

TSA is On Duty

Hey folks, Ron KC0MXX here, letting you know about something that Hams might take a real interest in. I am also known as Master Coordination Center Officer VanDyne of the Transportation Security Administration (TSA), a part of the Department of Homeland Security, working out of Omaha's Eppley Airfield. I am the only licensed Ham operator that the TSA has in the state of Nebraska, but that is changing.

TSA has a program that runs in conjunction with Army MARS for contingency communication across the country and in many of the US territories. In July Omaha will be joining the ranks of MARS capable TSA offices around the world. We have purchased nearly all of the equipment necessary to get the station up and running, but all of the staff members in my office need to get their Ham license for the station to actually go active. Our program coordinator for MARS is a VE Certified General Class Ham and will be here teaching classes for my co-workers in mid July. With a little luck and a scheduling coup I am hoping that we can get a couple of VEs from the area to join him in providing us with our own VE testing session. Anyone care to volunteer? I plan to upgrade to General at the same session and am putting in a great deal of time studying.

For our station we have purchased an ICOM 718 HF rig, which will be modified by TSA's project coordinator to gain access to the MARS frequencies; a Comet CHA250B broadband vertical antenna; an MFJ-4403 Voltage Conditioner; an LDG IT-100 automatic antenna tuner, and a PTC PACTOR Mode Modem. To this we are going to be adding a laptop using "AirMail" communications software, and of course a battery and charger.



Lance WN0L's XYL Darlene N0LOP not only




volunteers in the kitchen, but this year also bought some door prize tickets and wound up with the dual band (Chinese) H/T.




DRAKE 2A receiver \$350

Name That Antenna

Hwy 92 East side of I-29



George KD0NME was asking what this antenna was and no one could figure it out. You should start by noticing the top loop and (squint to see) ground plane things at the top. Note: They don't call it a ground plane

when it's up there, instead a 'capacity hat' to make the thing resonant at lower frequencies like on a 5 band HF vertical for 80M. Do you need more hints? You could get out of the car and go over to it, or notice that your car AM radio picks up interference when nearby, and actually picks up something at 770kc. Do you recall how to figure image freqs? That's what 770 is, an image. (Twice the IF from the original.) Now you're getting it right? It's a low power AM put up by Iowa Transportation so you can listen to traffic info. If you still want to know where to tune, add twice the IF (455) to the image freq. Their audio is distorted.
